## 9:22 – SLP update – Baldev Pooni

- Presentation issues affecting trades training BC
  - AEST undergoing funding review (most funding comes from ITA, and this hasn't adjusted for inflation)

- Shifting to online/virtual classrooms has resulted in lower pass rates for classes & SLEs
- Higher than usual fail rate for SLEs this is an indication that face-to-face is best route for successful outcomes
- Labour Market Outlook 2022 85,000+ jobs will be opening in trades in the next 10 years
  - 48% will come from high school
  - 8% coming from adult students (career change, going back to school)
  - 2% coming from unemployed
  - 34% will need to come from immigration (Need to offer a 2-year program in order for international students to get a 3-year visa)
- Competition for students is not with other trades programs it will be other programs at universities (academic, other applied programs)
- SMPF (Deans know about this funding) additional training funding. This request can only be used once.
- Other funding (e.g. Certified Trades) is not increasing
- o Significant problems hiring instructors all over province
- Industry reps are becoming frustrated when asked for input by ITA, but nothing materializes from it

#### Discussion

- o BC is expecting 8% interprovincial migration
- Action: Baldev will forward labour market outlook report, as well as his own report
- o 35,000 shortfall in labour market
- Total open jobs are closer to 100,000, when factoring in people who leave the profession/take other jobs
- Need to model 4-level apprenticeship program as a 4-year program in order to attract international students (needs to be min. 2 years to get a visa)
  - Sending students out for short-term practical training or model it as a co-op
- Perhaps instead of adjusting programs to meet federal requirements for international student program length, maybe federal standards should be adjusted

#### • View BC's results via ITA report handout

- Latest BC IP Pass rate is 60%, national is 46%
- o Including challengers in pass rate brings overall pass rate down
- Next year, Erik has asked ITA to provide apprenticeship #s and challenge #s and pass rates, we will do our own math

#### Discuss concerns and strategies

- o TRU has seen improved pass rates last year since coming back face-to-face
- Quick pivot to online delivery at beginning of COVID has led to lower IP pass rates (in some institutions, not all)
- o IP results are fairly consistent and high, small margin for error
- We need to produce journey people, yet IP pass rate is low (is exam too challenging?)

- Language/wording used in IP exam could be contributing to low pass rate (written differently than how carpenters communicate in industry)
- Completion rate from Foundation to IP has been a complaint in the past

## 1:02 – College reports

- North Island College: numbers are strong; offering foundation programs at smaller satellite campuses
- Thompson Rivers University: ran 10 apprenticeship classes in 2021. Working with home builders' association in Kamloops to build homes. Working with SD 73 to run sampler programs (industrial or mechanical). Fairly strong numbers.
- College of the Rockies: Running 5 apprenticeship intakes. Numbers are strong and returning to full again after COVID. Ran a pilot of Women in Trades in 2021. Opportunities to work with younger youths (grades 6-7). Currently setting up MS Teams can share out to group.
- **British Columbia Institute of Technology:** 6 apprenticeship intakes this year. Strong numbers going through to end of 2023/start of 2024; long waitlists. Running 4 foundation classes. Seeing

- good rates of students returning to Level 2 after completion of foundation/Level 1. Now offering a mass timber course in the summer will send feedback to the group.
- Coast Mountain College: numbers a bit low for foundation class; apprenticeship numbers getting stronger. Lower numbers during hybrid delivery but increasing with f2f instruction.
  Trades sampler running 2 cohorts currently.
- College of New Calendonia: 2 foundations per year, 8 apprenticeship intakes per year. Running 2 cohorts of trades discovery programs. Occasionally runs foundation program in Quesnel at satellite campus.
- **Selkirk:** 2 foundations per year, about 5 apprenticeship intakes per year. Numbers a little low this year. Also running a couple of sampler programs.
- **Northern Lights College:** Strong foundation numbers; apprenticeship numbers down since COVID, but now starting to recover. In September 2022 will start 6 youth sampler programs.
- **Camosun:** 24 apprenticeship classes per year; 1 foundation stream running continuously (two 6-month programs running concurrently). Foundation numbers are slightly lower but still viable.
- Vancouver Island University: Offered foundation in Kyuquot and Sechelt. 2 foundations in Nanaimo, 1 in Cowichan, 1 in Powell River; 12 apprenticeship classes in Nanaimo. Barely filling foundation classes but strong Level 1 numbers.
