- STBC Report for Carpenter Articulation Committee Meeting presented and report provided to Committee
- o Harmonized outline and curriculum available on website @ skilledtradesbc.ca
- Exams are in progress but have been delayed. Started with Level 1 and will continues with Level
 2 and 3 in the summer

- New process of implementation date will have all exams ready prior to implementation date.
 Discussion by Committee on delays
- Apprentice numbers reviewed. Question asked to STBC about Foundation students considered in the data captured.
- Question about peer review process. 4-person panel to review exams. Concern of such a small group of professionals making the decisions and edits.
- SLP and BCATTA decided who's on the panel. Faculty can participate by putting their name forward to their Dean.
- o Poor results for new SLE's; Standard review process after exams are released
- Online Exam Glitch discussed and rectified for future classes, Committee requested communications from STBC in future
- o Exam results are not immediate, STBC will follow up with their assessments team
- National Pass Rate Request by Committee to STBC for data to not include challengers.
 Request denied as the data is not able to be separated but will be asked again annually
- Accessibility issues brought up. If everyone is granted the accessibility they request, why not
 offer the extra hour to accommodate. Suggestion of making a better exam for future where the
 accessibility isn't a consistent issue
- Developing Foundation program outline for carpentry is in process. Workshops will be coming soon
- o Updating instructor requirements reasonable and standard across the board
- o SLE's
 - SLE for Foundations? Not in the near future
 - Provide student performance feedback after exams, could be used as a learning tool.
 How is this going to be actioned?
 - Language has been changed in exams
 - o How can they be more formative instead of summative?
 - Online exam feedback is available for both online and paper exams issue of students not having enough time to finish the exam and then give the feedback as well
 - More feedback requested to both students and institutions
 - Barriers to students: Test Anxiety
 - o If SLE is preparing students for their IP exam, how are we preparing our students and how are we giving them feedback?
- Funding concerns with no increases in decades, cut funding for women in trades and Indigenous students. Committee has asked STBC when will funding be adjusted.

- Vancouver Island University: Foundation classes are mostly full in 3 campuses
- o 12 Apprenticeship classes; Level 1 is full and waitlisted for the past 3 years
- o Trades Samplers, with strong student return to Trades programs post Sampler
- IP Results dip last year
- College of New Caledonia: 2 Foundation classes; 8 Apprenticeship classes, 2 of each level with Level 1 being waitlisted; Multiple campuses host apprenticeship programs
- o IP Results decent with close failures on first exam
- Coast Mountain College: 2 Foundation classes including dual credit students with 1 regional program hosted within Indigenous community; 9 Apprenticeship classes offered at campuses and regional locations; 2 YETS Programs
- o IP results stronger than SLE's, 80% success rate
- College of the Rockies: Foundation class with a waitlist; 5 Apprenticeship classes
- 3 Women in Trades programs annually
- o IP results stronger than SLE's 12/14 passed
- o North Island College: 2 Foundation classes; 11 Apprenticeship classes with waitlists

- IP Results 14/16 passed
- Camosun 2 Foundation classes including dual credit students; 24 Apprenticeship classes, Waitlist for Level 1 and 2's; Registration in Level 3 and 4 lower partially due to employer needs; Cut funding for women and indigenous programs have been shouldered by Camosun; Partnerships with school districts for various programs
- o IP Results 90 % success rate
- Northern Lights College: 1 Foundation classes; 4 Apprenticeship classes, Steady enrollment; 3 YETS programs
