#### 4. Program / Institutional reports

**COLT** is running a single group spring and fall this year for a total of 19. We had 29 last year.

#### **Columbia Bible College**

New program - Emergency Rescue Technician – one year certificate, has just completed its first year. Full at 20 for next year.

Ladders into Diploma in Outdoor Leadership at second year and into Applied Leadership degree.

#### **Camosun College**

Adventure Education graduate certificate program. 24 maximum. One-year program is professional development for teachers. Includes a facility / land-based residency at Strathcona Park Lodge and an expedition to Clayoquot Sound. Focus is on education, counselling and coaching, and is cohort based.

### **UBC** Faculty of Education

Outdoor education programming for teachers from ECE – grade 12

Focus on sustainability and outdoor education.

Programming is PD for teachers.

Outdoor Environmental Education Diploma in Education is completed over three to five years has 3 required courses and remainder are electives. 27 students, self-pacing. Up to 12 credits can come from other institutions.

Masters of Education program in curriculum studies HOPE – Health Outdoor and Physical Experiential Education.

UBC does not teach skills based courses. Outdoor learning is place based not expeditionary.

#### AdventureSmart

Canada wide education program aimed to reduce search and rescue calls.

Provincially funded program in BC.

Teams in Vancouver and Kelowna.

## Capilano University

Outdoor Recreation Diploma – full cohort for September.

May expand to a two-year program from the current 16 months.

Integrating Outdoor Council of Canada courses into field trips in the upcoming year.

Diploma ladders into Adventure Tourism concentration in Bachelor of Tourism Management degree.

## **West Coast Adventure College**

Program is full with 24 students.

Mix of land and water based programming.

Integrated curriculum.

Follows the provincial adventure programs core curriculum.

### TRU

Adventure Studies for 25 years.

Adventure Guide Certificate ladders into diploma with 48 students in first year and 35 in second year.

Diploma ladders into Bachelor of Tourism Management and Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies.

Successful Adventure Guide Certificate in Keflavik Iceland in partnership with TRU.

Canadian Mountain Ski Guide training and Assessment housed in ACMG is no longer administered by TRU.

## **College of the Rockies Golden**

Adventure Tourism Diploma and certificate program has 20 students in first year and 18 in second year.

#### Powell River SD 47

K- 12 programming Coast Mountain Academy, semester cohort focused on leadership, citizenship and adventure. LEAP – 9 day field school.

#### **Outdoor Council of Canada**

National organization offering outdoor leadership and wilderness skill sets as Field Leader courses in hiking, paddling, overnight, winter camping, horse-back trips.

### College of the Rockies Fernie

MAST – Mountain Adventure Skills Training program full with 18 for September. Challenge this year finding ski guides.

Working with CMH on a research project for tree-well rescue practices.

Ladders into Adventure Tourism diploma at Golden campus.

Emma and PJ - AdventureSmart is working to reduce costs and numbers of SAR calls. Education in schools and communities, including tourism centres and trail heads throughout British Columbia. Six programs are offered. Programs are delivered by volunteers across Canada and are free to the public.

Opportunities for partnerships with post- secondary institutions can include training faculty and students to deliver programming.

Aiming for consistent messaging.

Opportunities include: brand - AdventureSmart accreditation, promotion / marketing of post-secondary programs within the K-12 schools, opportunities to invite the public onto our campuses for AdventureSmart courses, access to tracking and statistics, opportunities for AdventureSmart messaging to reach international markets through our students.

#### **AdventureSmart Notes:**

BC AdventureSmart is a non-profit organization that works on behalf of BC Search and Rescue Association to reduce the number and severity on incidents across the province. We aim to achieve this through public education and outreach. BC AdventureSmart would like to partner with outdoor education programs to expose students of our simple messaging, in the hopes that they can carry this information into their future careers and educate others on outdoor preparedness.

We'd like to be as flexible as possible to ensure that we're able to work within the confines of the many different programs offered across the province. Currently, we have two training options (outlined below), but again to reiterate, we are adaptable to any different way in which we can incorporate our messaging into the different programs.

### **Presenter Training Workshop:**

This is a 6 hour workshop that involves training in three of the 6 programs. It includes how to to deliver the programs and then how to enter statistics into our website for tracking purposes. It also goes over AdventureSmart's history, how Search and Rescue works, and a short discussion on social media - how to be a responsible poster and a social influencer. This workshop certifies its' attendees as AdventureSmart Volunteer Presenters in whichever programs they received training for. Ideally in this workshop we train the <a href="Hug-A-Tree and Survive Program">Hug-A-Tree and Survive Program</a>, the <a href="Survive Outside Program">Survive Program</a> then an additional program of your choosing.

## **Awareness Training Workshop:**

This is a 2 hour workshop that involves a brief overview of who BC AdventureSmart is and information about Search Rescue, followed by an overview of our <u>Survive Outside Program</u>, with weight on the messaging and delivery (as most of the information will already by known by avid outdoor users). This workshop also includes information on how to be an AdventureSmart social ambassador, discussion about the importance of leading by example, and the value of person-to-person interactions and information sharing. This workshop does not certify attendees to become presenters, it instead promotes the use of our messaging through conversation and social media.

#### **Admission Average Calculation**

A minimum average of 65% (2.5 on a 4 point scale) is required to be eligible for admission consideration.

#### Notes:

- 1. Students who completed core physical education theory and/or performance analysis courses 10 or more years ago must complete at least two core theory courses at third/fourth year level and core performance analysis courses before applying.
- 2. Degrees in recreation, leisure or health science/services will not satisfy requirements. Individual possessing these degrees may have to take a considerable amount of additional courses relevant to secondary PE to be considered for admission.
- 3. The French immersion option is not available for Physical Education.
