





Is it true that all 25 BC public institutions send and receive transfer credits?








Is it true that more than half of dual credit students continue into post-secondary?

SIP Dual Credit Students: within 10 years




Passing grade was **68% or higher** depending on program/ course











Credits Taken in First Year at Universities



Is it true that BC transfer students have significantly lower GPAs when they convocate from a university than do direct entry students?







What did we learn?

- Over 54,000 BC students move over well over 400,000 credits annually. This is fairly consistent, with perhaps a slight reduction in the proportion of mobile students.
- BC's transfer system has higher transfer rates than 30 US states. There are many transfer models. BC is fairly unique in having all public institutions sending and receiving.
- Transfer students differ from direct entry students
 demographically, but they take similar course loads and
 perform as well as direct entry students at university.
